There's much to tell you in this last newsletter before our summer hiatus, but I

have to begin with applause for the wonderful **Rancho Nipomo Heritage Day** at the Dana Adobe last Saturday.

Not only is the Adobe practically a mystical place (and we all need to keep working to save the surrounding countryside from development), but for this day it was inhabited by a fine selection of "18th and 19th Century" people. You could watch soap making or learn how to dye yarn using native plants. A flint knapper made arrowheads and I learned that "ox" is a generic term for a 4 year old, trained work animal, no matter the breed, and that they follow voice commands, not prodding, so are virtually impossible to steal. We ate bread from the newly constructed Horno (pron: orno), an oven of the day.

A "vaquero" worked in an elegant and beautiful way with his horse, while he explained the life of the "Californios." He also taught me how to care for our rawhide lariat on display in The Barn. I won't bore you with the process but it involves raw beef liver. I learn, I learn. All this for \$3. Mark your calendars for next year. It was an extraordinary day that ended with a BBQ and entertainment in the evening.

<u>THE MEATLOCKER</u> - Our Village facade is nearly done. Our brilliant painter, **John Bryant**, assisted by stalwarts **Don Gullickson** and **Bill Smith** put in a hard week of long hours at the tops of ladders and a gizmo called a scissor lift, creating a true Victorian paint job on the front of our building. There's more to do before we're finished, but you can drive by or even stop and admire our antique lock, restored and installed by **Frank's Lock & Key**.

<u>SCHOOLHOUSE MAPS</u> - Two are "in process", one waiting for the correct framing material and one in line at the restorer's. When that one returns, more will go out. Thanks to **Linda Shephard** for her research and shipping chores, to **Gus & Rossie Berger** for spearheading the effort on the restoration, and to our "angel," **Michael Gillespie**, whose mother used to teach in a one-room schoolhouse.

"THE 1940'S -The War & Beyond" - A new display will be in place for a grand opening at Heritage House on Sunday, June 5th, just in time for D-Day. The following is a report by Kathleen Sullivan about the visit to the weavers who appeared at Harvest Festival 2004, and will again display in the Harvest Festival 2005.

On a beautiful, Central Coast morning, 16 lively ladies left Santa Manuela Schoolhouse to wend their way to Atascadero and a visit with the Thorne sisters.

Retired librarians, the sisters, now expert weavers, had agreed to give us a tour and mini lecture on the art of weaving.

The tour group consisted of docents from the Dana Adobe and the South County Historical Society.

The trip wound through valleys as green as any in Ireland and replete with wildflowers.

Our arrival at the straw bale barn, yes, I said straw, was heralded by magpies and horses.

The barn, made of straw and stucco, was spacious and airy, with light provided by skylights. The structure needs no, or little, heat in the winter and no air-conditioning in the summer. A few heaters scattered here and there provide needed warmth and throwing open the upstairs windows will provide cool air when necessary.

The sisters took us through the steps from shearing the sheep, cleaning the wool, carding, spinning it into usable hanks, dyeing, and finally, weaving. We were shown works in progress, both on traditional looms and one run by computer.

After the tour, 19 of us headed to Templeton to feast at McFee's.

Great tour, good food, and lots of new friends. Good show, Jane!

The Santa Manuela Schoolhouse belltower has been showing signs of old age, and the bell was getting more and more difficult to toll. So Vivian Krug asked Fire Chief Fibitch if they could give a hand in investigating the problem.

True to our small town community attitude, 3 volunteer firemen Capt Steve Whitney Engineer Patrick Iron and Fi

firemen, Capt. Steve Whitney, Engineer Patrick Irey, and Fire-fighter John King showed up and Steve climbed up into the belfry and determined that besides one of the pulleys being detached, the bell framework was well worn, and though not critical, should be replaced.



The adjustments proved successful as the following day, 30 3rd-graders took turns ringing the bell easily.

150 more 3rd-graders are scheduled for field trip tours of our museums in the next two weeks, so the bell will get further testing.

Volunteers John Bryant and Don Gullickson

braved the heights while painting the façade of our Society's headquarters— currently referred to as "The Meatlocker" in the Village.

Under the direction of our Curator **Jan Scott**, with the permission of the building owner **Carol Hizey**, the blessings of the city Architectural Review Committee, and the applause of Village merchants, the "missing tooth in a beautiful smile" is being capped and polished.

"South County Historical Society" will be featured on a new sign over the doors. The sign is being created by 'Avila Signs', makers of the other museum signs at Paulding History House, Heritage House Museum, Santa Manuela Schoolhouse, and The Barn. This improvement is being funded partially by a grant from the 'City Façade Improvement Program'.
