

dedicated to correcting our negative cash flow, a constant thorn in the Societv's side, and to

increase our membership base. The result of their efforts is our current Board of Directors which I consider to be the hardest-working I have had the pleasure of serving with in my five years as your president

The goal of bringing in more income to offset our growing expenses is a major one and can only be achieved by creating new sources of revenue. New blood, new ideas, and new energy for the future can only be realized by increasing our membership. To this end, I would like to laud some of the new faces that have joined the team.

Believe it or not we actually have some Board members that don't qualify for a senior discount; one of them is Sandy Arnold, our Second Vice-President, Membership, who amazes us all with her ideas, dedication and hours volunteered to the society. Another, Vivian Krug, Publicity Director, has been a godsend. She has single-handedly created a magnificent web site for us and is a virtual fountain of marketing techniques for bringing in more income. Carol Sargent, Treasurer, is modifying our accounting system so we will be able to see where every dime is spent and can therefore rein in escalating expenses. Bless you all!

Each of our Board members has a legal fiduciary responsibility to uphold. They must identify new sources of income and keep our society fiscally responsible.

A consortium of the South County senior groups recently presented such an income opportunity to the Society. Your Board had a limited time frame in which to respond to this opportunity but voted with an overwhelming majority to pursue the management contract for the South County Regional Center. Within about ten days a business plan was developed for managing the Center and this proposal has been submitted to the County. Our proposal is truly a win-winwin situation. The seniors get two small rooms as a day center. The County gets more usage of a taxpayer facility at no additional cost. Most importantly for the Society, we get a free place to meet and an income potential for the next five years.

The South County Historical Society is a large. thriving non-political, non-profit corporation comprised of

The date, March 31, 2004. The time, 11:30 p. m. Owls screeching in the cold, dark night and the sounds of horses coming from the West, to the haunting strains of an organ playing the Moonlight Sonata. A hundred people gathered in front of the Loomis building on East Branch Street.

A run of the mill Arroyo Grande evening? Hardly, but a historic evening indeed, for the expectant crowd was about to witness a requiem of Arroyo Grande's "terrible tragedy", which occurred 118 years ago, at midnight, no more than 400 feet from the site of the hushed gathering.

Gordon Bennett, who arranged the late night requiem, then told the story of a land dispute that led to the murder of Walker and the subsequent hanging of the two "Hemmis," by masked riders who came under cover of darkness to avenge the slaying.



Another of the evening's speakers, Kirk Scott, President of the South County Historical Society, related that the lynching most likely occurred because justice in those times moved very slowly. Fearing it might never come, a vigilante group took the law into their own hands.

A marker, commemorating the tragedy is located in front of the Loomis property on East Branch Street, on the corner just west of where the Pacific Coast Railway once traveled and from whose bridge the men were hanged.

Gordon Bennett had provided pictures, Dick Blankenburg developed an historical timeline, and the Society, with the assistance of Jean Hubbard. chose pictures from the archives of before and after the dam construction. The storyboard had been requested for display at the recent Friends of Lopez Family Day, and staff and visitors were very impressed with the presentation, so it was agreed to gift the display to the Nature Center.

Foundation awarded a grant of \$1,800 for the ***** writing and publication of a tour booklet for the South The Book Committee County Historical Society. determined that the book collection included history of the area but there were some missing pieces of information. For example, some folks knew about the 🚣 early Mexican land grants, but were unable to place 🖌 ☆ \star exactly where they were. And, since many of the old \star 🖈 landmarks were gone, or, like Santa Manuela School, 🖈 ☆ were moved, it was hard to get a clear picture of "what * was" and relate it to "what is".

The Committee decided that a tour booklet might make ☆ that link.. However, the south county is so huge that it 🝒 $\frac{1}{2}$ was impossible to cover all of the area in one booklet (or $\frac{1}{2}$ 🖌 one tour, or one day) and so the area was divided into 🖌 sections. "Touring Rural Arroyo Grande" was chosen 🖈 for the first book.

Influenced by the Folklore Committee that compiled and published the "Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" series, it was decided to include articles by local folks telling us a bit of history and also sharing what is currently going 🕌 ☆ 🙀 on in the rural Arroyo Grande area and incorporate those 🙀 🖈 articles into a tour that will take the driver (and 🛧 \star passengers) from Heritage House to Huasna, back across the Arroyo Valley to Lopez Lake and out Hi Mountain Road, back to Orcutt Road, returning to Arroyo Grande ☆ via Corbett Canyon.

 \star According to the information from the publisher, the \star booklet is ready to go to print. It is our hope that it will be available by the May 15 General Meeting.

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
